

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

April 1st 2021 - March 30th 2022 Chris Hellawell

Overview

This year saw the beginnings of the return of 'normal' for ETL and the wider world. We still felt the effects of the pandemic, particularly in the workshops, but we adapted and implemented changes as the world gradually opened up. It was a particularly encouraging year for the library, seeing the membership numbers recover from the pandemic, and people feeling comfortable to share again. We were able to open up the open sessions in a controlled manner, and restart our outreach programme, focussing on taking the workshop to the groups, rather than bringing them into our enclosed workshop spaces.

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HEADLINE FIGURES

Financial year 2021-2022

- Members completed
 5938 unique loans
- This equates to an estimated
 £240,000+ saving for members compared to the cost of buying the same tools
- **43.4tons** of CO2 was saved by members in total (driving an average car round the world 43 times!)
- These figures are a 68% increase on the previous 12 months (but still 20% down on the last pre-pandemic year)
- The average active library member saves over £365 compared to buying the tools they borrowed

HUMAN RESOURCES

Staff updates and changes

We had some comings and goings with staff during the 2021-22 year. Alice McGillicuddy moved back to the USA in February 2022 after doing some fabulous work during a very strange time to join the organisation. We were fortunate to be able to directly replace her in a job share between two of our volunteer group, James King and Joe Buckley, who brought with them fantastic woodworking and fabrication skills. They both took part time roles and we were delighted to be able to welcome them into the group.

We also recruited two new staff member through the Community Jobs Scotland scheme from SCVO, Gabe Gardiner and Rosie Sinclair. Gabe had been one of the young people supported through our Tools For Life programme, and we were delighted to be able to turn this into a paid role. Rosie was the amazing volunteer who we worked with on the Edinburgh Mask Makers project during the pandemic, and we were delighted to be able to recruit her. At time of writing, the funding for CJS has been cut, but we have been able to keep Rosie on the staff team, and Gabe is still part of our volunteer community.

Janet had a second little one, and took maternity leave, allowing us to give more hours to Terence Finnegan, who had been working for us on a freelance basis.

As always, we couldn't do what we do without volunteers, contributing what is effectively two members of full time staff every week. They managed our library, ran workshops sessions, helped us with graphic design, data handling, building things, upgrading spaces, stepped up at community events, gave up their spare time to make ETL the groundbreaking trailblazing thing it is. THINGS THAT HAVE HAPPENED

COP 26 Announcement

COP 26 took place in Glasgow in November 2021, and the Scottish Government and Zero Waste Scotland <u>announced support</u> for a joint proposal from Circular Communities Scotland, The Edinburgh Remakery, and ETL to fund a <u>Scottish</u> <u>Share and Repair Network</u> to support the proliferation of sharing library and repair cafe models across Scotland, with the target of 100 such organisations working across the country within 3 years. ETL was active in pushing for this additional support, and involved in the recruitment process for new staff for the network, and we will be taking active ongoing role in developing the network, passing on our knowledge and experience from starting the first sharing library of any kind in the UK.

Meadowbank Tool Library

We successfully applied to <u>Place for People</u> take over an empty unit in the Meadowbank/Lochend area of the city, approximately half a mile from our unit on Spey Street Lane. This is on a rent free basis for 2 years, saving ETL around £3k a year, and more importantly, putting sharing libraries in a more prominent location. No longer are we a back street secret! The move into the building was financially supported by funding from <u>Travis Perkins</u>, and in kind help from <u>Novus</u> to make the space accessible, versatile, usable and beautiful.

Volunteer Wellbeing pack

Thanks to a small piece of funding from the Tudor Trust, we were able to develop a Volunteer Wellbeing Pack, to welcome, support and maintain our volunteers (maintenance isn't just for tools!). As well as the pack itself, containing procedures, tips, tricks and signposting, we also hosted a variety of events for volunteers to work on their personal wellbeing, as well as setting aside money for coaching and counseling services.





Volunteer Assemblies

Our Volunteer Assembly programme restarted in September after it's covid delays. At the September event volunteers decided to do weekend builds for Parson's Green Primary School and Granton Hub. 40 people helped out on the two volunteer builds.

We ran a second event in January which selected projects by Bridgend Farmhouse and Lauriston Farm, which took place in April (so tune in to the next AGM to find out about them!)

Workshops and Outreach Reopening

Having restricted access to the workshops over the pandemic, this year market the return to people using our workshop spaces. Initially we had volunteers coming in pairs to make things for charity groups (little free libraries for example), then we implemented a new system of booking using Eventbrite, which allowed us to limit numbers in the spaces, as well as maintaining safe numbers. We also trained up volunteers to do many of the safety inductions to respond to the huge demand for people using the workshops. We not only had to induct new members, but as it had been a year and a half since other members had been in our workshops, we also had to retrain them too. **Volunteers inducted 221 members** to safely use our workshops (in only 9 months)

Community Outreach

Our community outreach started up again in February 2021 and continued throughout the year, although with restrictions about numbers and settings. We worked mainly outside with our groups, delivering long term interventions with a variety of groups in the city including Rowan Alba, The Thistle Centre,, LGBT Youth Scotland, The Citadel, Saheliya, Granton Community Garden and Social Bite amongst many others.

Our Nailing It! Project restarted, working with groups of marginalised and disadvantaged women around the city, as did our Women and Non-binary Makers sessions.




Annual Accounts FY 2021-22

- A massive on-going thanks to all our funders throughout the year and of course, to you, our members for your continued support of the ETL




Receipts and payments FY2021-22

Year-on-year funding sources




Restricted fund use in FY2021-22
